It is the birthplace of the National Anthem.

Old Fort McHenry over which floated the "Star Spangled Banner," immortalized by Key, should be a Mecca for patriotic Americans.

Located practically on Chesapeake Bay, Baltimore offers to visitors unrivalled opportunities for trips to the various resorts along this great inland waterway.

Youngest of all the great commercial cities of the Atlantic seaboard, Baltimore business operations aggregate a total of \$1,000,000,000, manufactures leading. It is the chief oyster market in the country.

As a city of beautiful monuments and parks, it ranks very high among American municipalities. It contains the first monument erected in honor of Washington; the Francis Scott Key or "Star Spangled Banner" monument, and what is reputed to be the first monument erected on American soil to Columbus.

It is important as an educational center, Johns Hopkins University being noted as the foremost institution in the country devoted to research work. Goucher College, the Peabody Institute, and the Maryland University are well known, and the Walters Art Gallery and the Enoch Pratt Free Library attract thousands of lovers of art and literature.

Baltimore has an excellent climate, free from the extreme cold of the cities further north, and of the enervating heat of the South. Its hotels offer the best that money can command in entertainment, and it has ample accommodations for conventions and meetings of all kinds.

In most cases, through tickets reading via Baltimore are good to stop-off for ten days, subject to certain conditions. Application should be made to Ticket Agents and Conductors for further information regarding stop-over privileges.

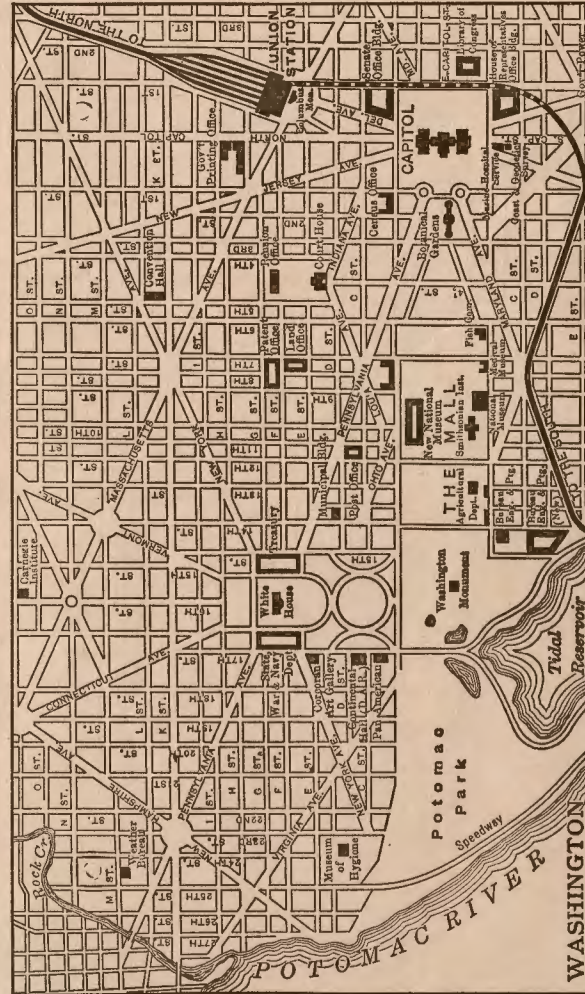
