RESPONSIBILITY—The Pennsylvania Railroad is responsible for errors in time tables, nor for inconvenience or damage resulting from delayed trains or failure to make connections. The schedules shown herein are subject to change without notice.

AIR - CONDITIONED TRAINS — Air - conditioned equipment has been assigned to regular sections of trains as shown herein, and every effort will be made to provide it as specified, but the right is reserved to employ non-air-conditioned cars in such trains as necessitated by volume of traffic or operating contingency.

CHILDREN—Under 5 years of age, free, when accompanied by parent or guardian; 5 years of age and under 12, one-half fare; 12 years of age or over, full fare.

BAGGAGE MAXIMUMS AND LIABILITY—No single piece of baggage exceeding 300 pounds in weight or 72 inches in greatest dimension, or single shipment exceeding \$2.500.00 in value, will be checked. Free allowance and liability are subject to tariff stipulation as to contents, weight, value and size.

Passengers have the privilege of declaring excess value on their baggage at a nominal charge of ten cents for each additional \$100.00 or fraction thereof over that allowed on their ticket. Limits of valuation that may be declared by one passenger not to exceed \$2,500.00.

DELIVERY OF BAGGAGE-Passengers desiring to DELIVERY OF BAGGAGE—Passengers desiring to have their baggage delivered promptly to their home address, hotel, club, office or steamship pler in the prin-cipal cities can have this arranged upon application to the agent or checkman at starting point. The transfer charge may be paid at the time of checking baggage or when same is delivered at destination address.

Authorized transfer companies in the principal cities will call for and check baggage from home, hotel, club of office address upon presentation of valid transportation.

FORWARDING OF BAGGAGE—Every effort will be made to facilitate the handling of baggage, but cannot guarantee to forward baggage on same train with owner: nor can time of arrival at destination to which checked be guaranteed. To facilitate prompt receipt of their baggage at destination, passengers are advised, whenever it is possible to do so, to check it in advance in order that same may be forwarded on a preceding train.

SPECIAL ARRANGEMENTS FOR CHECKING HAND-BAGS

At Manhattan Transfer.—The usher on platform at Manhattan Transfer, between the hours of 6.00 A. M. and 11.00 P. M. Standard Time, will receive and check bags for passengers arriving on all trains from the West and South, including Philadelphia, to be handled to Pennsylvania Station, New York, free of charge, and will also arrange for delivery to any home, hotel, club or office address in New York City at the regular transfer charge.

At North Philadelphia—Upon application to red-cap porters, they will arrange for delivery of bags by the Union Transfer Company to any home, hotel, club or office ad-dress in Philadelphia and the suburbs at rate of fifty (50) cents per piece.

At Broad Street Station and Pennsylvania Station (30th Street)—Upon application to red-cap porters, they will arrange for delivery of bags by the Union Transfer Company to any home, hotel, club or office address in Philadelphia and the suburbs at rate of fifty (50) cents per piece.
